ANNUAL FUNDRAISING CAMPAIGN

As we have done in previous years, our **“Educating Changemakers”** campaign to raise funds for the Local Scholarship Program at Green School Bali was launched on December 1st 2020. It was done right on the day of Giving Tuesday. This, as the name suggests, is a day meant for giving. The idea is that people would “spend” for philanthropic purposes or to do good, on the Tuesday following Black Friday and Cyber Monday,

Admittedly, this year presented us quite the challenge, owing largely to the on-going pandemic. Yet, with the generosity of our donors and their continued support we were able to defy the odds and reach our target for the year. This is as much your accomplishment as it is ours. IGNITE – BALI 1960’s FUNDRAISING EVENT

Like the years before, we stayed true to our commitment of infusing the island’s culture by working together with some of Bali’s creative masterminds to provide our guests with never before seen traditional performances. This year’s event – held under strict COVID protocols – presented a truly exceptional Balinese experience, and allowed guests the opportunity to ignite change, and make a big difference in the lives of these children.

IGNITE 2021 successfully raised USD 102,000 through ticket sales and auction items, demonstrating the attendees’ bold commitment to **ignite** the change that our local scholars will bring to the world. All contributions go toward supporting the education of our local changemakers, ensuring the sustainability of our beloved Local Scholarship Program.

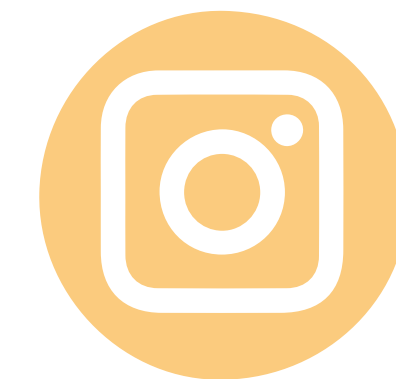

Bali Medicine

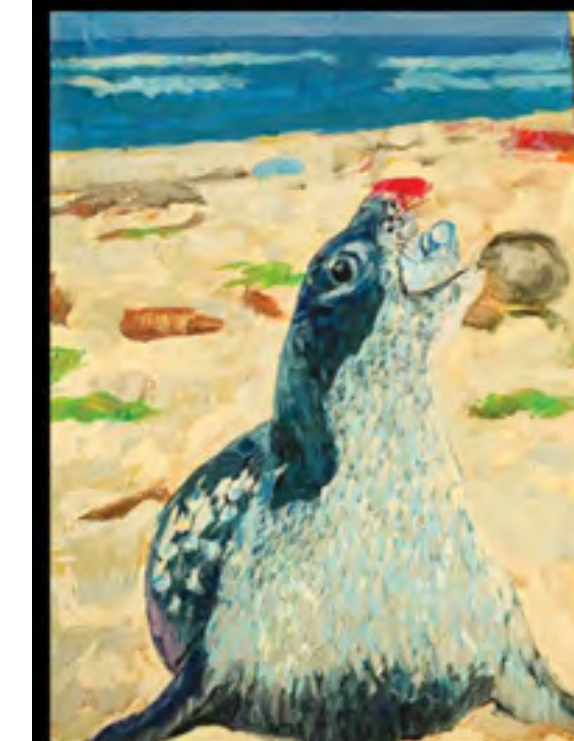

In the near future Uci will be publishing her very own book titled “Mud is My Life”, that she wrote for her Green Stone. This autobiography explores the tales of how she first came to the school and faced many obstacles in her journey; but, would soon learn to overcome them.

In her book she tells how she aspires to carry on the dreams of her father’s to bring the people of the world together in a patch of muddy ricefield through Mepantigan – a form of mixed martial arts founded by Uci’s father, Putu Witsen, that incorporates Balinese and East Indonesian traditions.

Through her autobiography, Uci would like to let the world know that delivering a true story is hard. It pushes you to be vulnerable, to be honest with the darkest corners of your life, to deliver the truth as it is. Which, in Uci’s words, “is okay”.



Stella Winata
Language in the Subcurrent

Stella’s Green Stone was about showcasing a personal journey through art. Allowing the audience/viewers to give meaning through their own eyes and perspectives. Her eloquent and captivating presentation was delivered in a monologue, using rhymes and metaphors. She highlighted the human tendency to morph, translate, or reproduce ideas that create confusion and ambiguity. This is the non-duality nature of spoken language. Whereas for arts, “...the main goal is to find personal means of expression. ‘Tis a language which truly expresses what lies within.” says Stella.

Let Me Hold Your Hand

Ni Luh promoted the message of standing against violence toward women, and shed light on the harsh reality that women in Indonesia face. She proved that Indonesian law does not accommodate violence against women as misconceptions and ambiguity is found within the laws itself. Ni Luh found that the different forms of violence or harassment are not acknowledged by law. What's more, is that victim shaming unfortunately still exists.

That is when she decided to intern at the KIM's Women Center. There she held the delicate hands of women who were abused, listened to their stories, and taught them how they could empower themselves. "Each of us must find our own way to cope with what we are experiencing, and I'm here to hold hands with you." Ni Luh made it clear that she is against the act of violence towards women, and has joined the national women empowerment movement of "Sahkan RUU PKS".

In Indonesian, women translates to perempuan. The word itself is derived from two different words [per] meaning living being; and [empu] meaning precious, noble, or honored. In her Green Stone, Yuka explains that in the Balinese/Hindu culture women are also placed in a very respectful position.

However, Yuka explains that her society is not very female friendly. She witnesses the inequality that herself and other women are experiencing, and how Balinese culture tends to leave women powerless. "There are moments when you have to choose to be silent, and when to speak up." she claims. The pent up frustration of dealing and being treated unequally led her to help empower other Balinese women. "Education is key to women empowerment," Yuka said. Through education, we can empower; and with empowerment we open more doors and opportunities, gain independence and confidence, leading to an increased quality of life.

Gusde Nathanjaya *Finalist of an International Sustainability Innovation Competition*



In April of 2021, our local scholar Gusde registered himself to an international innovation competition.

What started out as a school project, is now turning into a global call-to-action. Gusde's staircase that generates electricity has been acknowledged by the Spellman HV Clean Tech Competition committee and has entered the final round.

Out of more than a thousand entries, Gusde with his "One Small Step Renewable Solutions" project is one of ten finalists. On Thursday August 5th, he presented his project for the entire world to see – live.

Jessica

Baking to Save the Turtles

In April, Jessica, our third grade local scholar, learned that the turtle population in Bali is slowly decreasing. As an effort to protect her most favorite animal in the world, she started a fundraising bake sale throughout the last month of the school year.

Together with the help of her mother, Jessica baked and sold chocolate chip cookies, brownies, banana cakes, as well as other pastries. **In total she managed to raise 1,250,000 IDR (roughly 85 USD)** and donated all the proceeds to the Saba Asri Sea Turtle Conservation. Because of her hard work and love for the sea turtles, **Jessica helped conserve a further 100 turtle eggs**. These eggs are expected to hatch in August, where she can see for herself the baby turtles make their way to the vast blue ocean.

Accesible Water Filter for All

Dipta, our grade nine local scholar, kick-started his very own brand called Liquify over the course of the 2020/2021 academic year. It is a buy one give one project where he aims to **provide an ultra water filtration system to communities in Bali that have a lack of clean drinking water**, with every purchase of a product sold.

While there are plenty of water filtration system solutions distributed and sold on the island, they are not the most affordable options for these communities. With that in mind, through Liquify, Dipta is going to donate (for free) a filtration system that can instantly filter drinking water for every household.

THE LOCAL SCHOLARS' JOURNAL

Our local scholars would like to share with you their stories and experiences from this past year. This is their journal, their stories, that you made possible.

Dear Donors,

My name is Niluh, I am one of the Local Scholarship students here at Green School Bali. I have been at Green School since I was in Kindergarten, now I'm in my first year and I will be graduating this June. I come from the northern and eastern parts of Bali (Kintamani, Bangli and Karangasem).

Green School means everything to me and since I have been here for the majority of my life, it might not be easy for me to be away from it when I graduate. It has been a wonderful blessing for me to be able to study here. I am beyond grateful for every opportunity that is offered to me and my local friends. I really, really enjoy meeting other students from all over the globe, become friends with them, learn about their cultures, stories, different dishes, and get taught some of their languages and accents really cool! I really hope more local children are given opportunities to study and interact with people from all around the world.

There are countless experiences that are really special to me, it's hard to think of the best ones! But some of the ones from recent years are: Into The Woods theatre in year 9 (we performed 3 nights at school and took a week's trip to perform in Java). A one week trip to Lombok in year 10, a group of 20 students and a few teachers visited an orphanage called Peduli Anak. And during my year 11 camp, my classmates and I learned to be First Aid Responders and got certified Village Responder Advanced First Aid!! It was very exciting! And the final experience that is one I keep very close to my heart is Vday.

You may or may not have heard of Vday before. It is a global activist movement started by activist, playwright, and author of the Vagina Monologues, Eve Easter, in the year 1998. It is a movement to end violence against women and girls. It is celebrated annually on the 19th of February, the same day as Valentine's Day, and has been celebrated at Green School for more than 7 years. Vday has always been a very special event for me ever

since I first watched one of the performances when I was in year 8. I remember it being so full of emotion, of love, of anger, and of power. It inspired me and empowered me so much, and I like to believe that it has helped me become and grow into the person I am today.

I think it's important for our community to be part of this movement because having an entire community be united and standing up and speaking up, holds a tremendous amount of power and gives the movement a lot of life and colour. I also think that knowing that people are supporting each other and having each other's back is reassuring, especially for young girls and boys, the LGBTQ+ and the people of colour community, who have stories to tell. It gives them that platform, that leverage, and that gentle but firm push to help them tell their story and speak up, and also being a safety net and safe space for them.

This year is slightly different situation than previous years because of the Covid 19 pandemic, the Vday crew are still planning on how to make the event happen. What I know so far is that there will definitely be the voices performances! My castmates are so very excited to perform!

Since I was a little girl, women from my home country never ceased to make me proud. From their strong will to make sure their families are happy, up to their performing arts skills. I feel so incredibly lucky to be born a Balinese woman, being surrounded by these heroes. Not just women, but girls my age and under gives me hope that I can do whatever I set my mind to. Age is not a limit, gender is not a limit, even the sky is not a limit!

But these wonderful things also makes me think of the not-so-pretty side of being a woman in Indonesia. Domestic abuse is a common thing here, even though a lot of us prefer not to talk about it, it is a very real thing. Since women are stereotypically the "weaker" ones, they often become victims to domestic abuse (this happens to children too). I have a feeling that a lot of them know that it's not right, but there they're silenced by more threats of abuse.

Lack of proper education for girls. In some regions of Indonesia, girls will drop out of school, and the reason is early marriage and the society's stereotypical mindset. Women and girls are just as deserving of education as men and boys. They have the right to build a future of their own and not have to depend on men. And in my opinion, education plays an important part in helping women and girls to fight for their rights.

KUL KUL CONNECTION

A YEAR IN REVIEW FOR THE KUL KUL CONNECTION

For several years the Kul Kul Connection (KKC) has connected Green School Bali with the local communities – providing free English tutoring programs for local children around the campus, and are only required to bring 5 kg of garbage that they collect from their surrounding neighborhood.

In 2020 there were 113 local students who enrolled for the program. Teaching and learning proceeded via google meet during the pandemic. To maintain the togetherness and sense of community with our KKC members, an online assembly was also held online in December 2020.

Thankfully, the KKC community were able to gather for an End of Year Gathering on campus which also saw seven grade 12 KKC students graduate from the program. Like Green School tradition, a celebration was held before sending them off into the world.

KKC celebrated the “Footprint” presentation of 3 students, Kayla, Anan and Nindi. Like Quest and Green Stone, Footprints are the rite-of-passage projects for the Primary School grade students. The 3 brilliant students started initiatives that they also showed to their families and communities.

Using his artistic skills, **Anan** crafted his very own “trash hero” poster to deliver a message on how everyone can contribute to help our environment such as 3R (reduce, reuse, recycle), plant more trees, and use less plastic.

Kayla made simple upcycled plant pots using plastic bottles that can be hung indoors or outdoors.

Nindi collected hard PET plastic from her home and turned it into a set of plastic keychains that she shared with her friends and families.

Despite having most activities carried out online this year, KKC has always been an initiative to raise the awareness of local Balinese children to look after the environment. Which is why on June 8th 2021, KKC held a community beach cleanup at Seseh Beach Badung with 20 students joined.

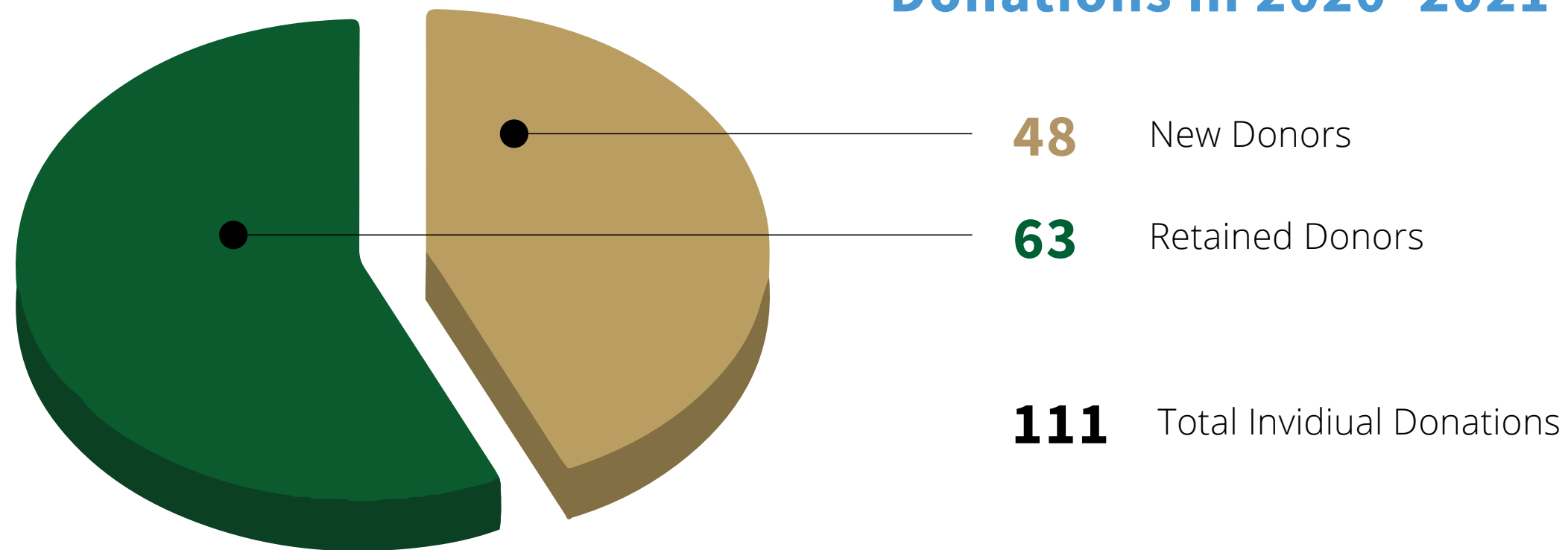
